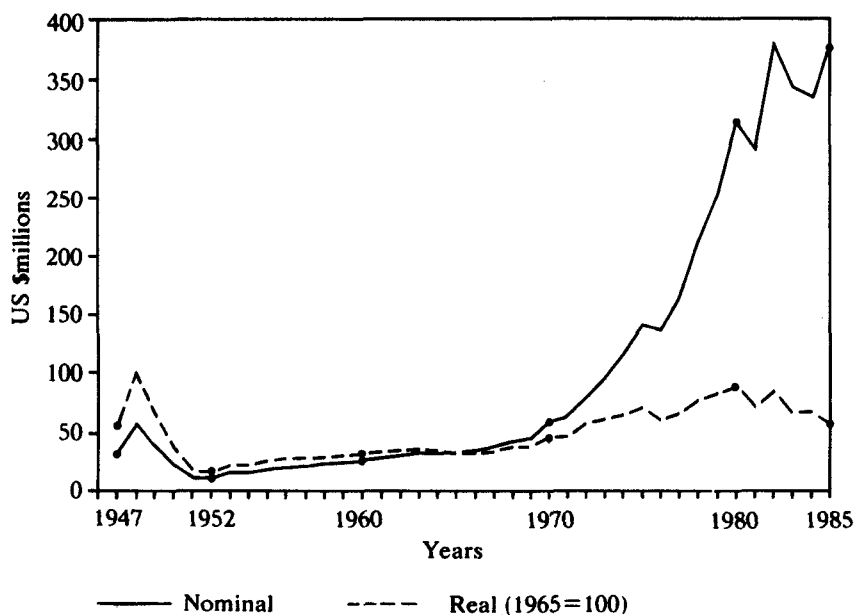
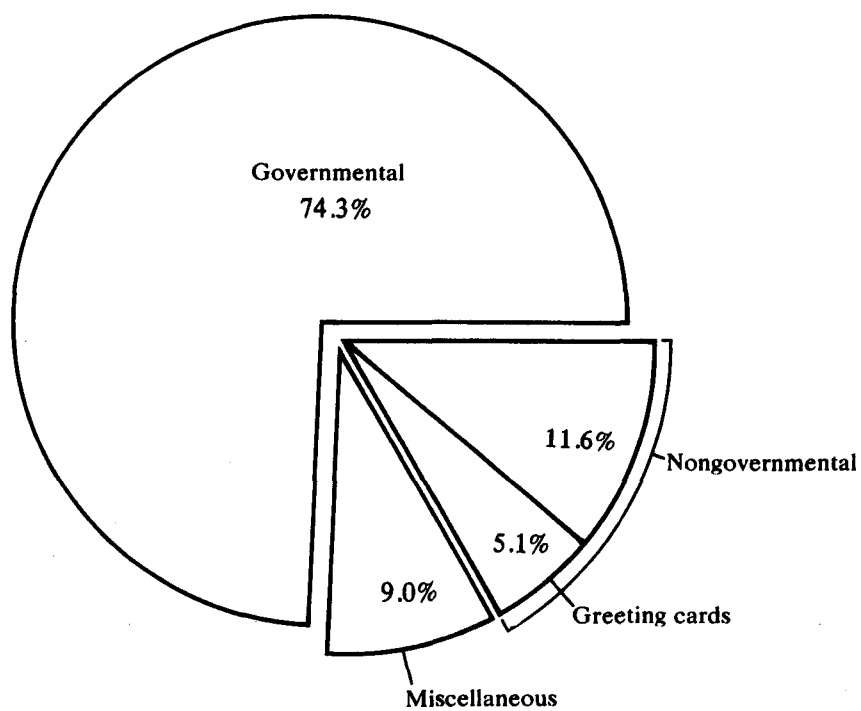


## Unicef Total Income 1947-85

### Real and Nominal Terms

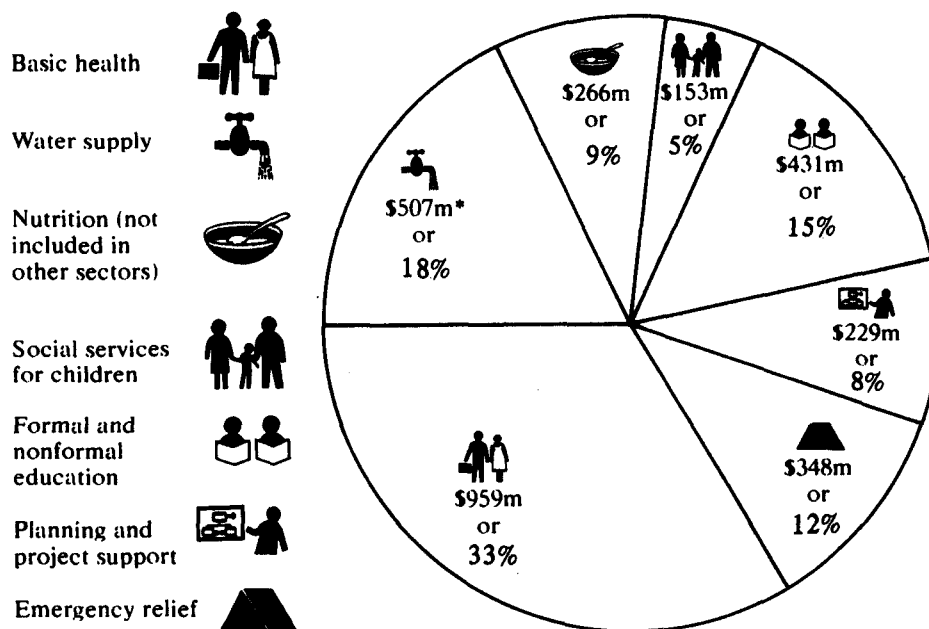


## Unicef Income 1947-85 in Percentages by Source of Funds
