

INFORMATION NOTE BY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ON STATUS OF UNICEF AID TO KOREA

This note is circulated for the information of members of the Executive ward.

The UNICEF Chief of Mission to Korea, Dr. C. W. MacCharles, is now in upan participating with other U.N. officials in plans for relief operations & Korea.

The UNICEF Mission Chief first reached Seoul, Korea in February 1950. He is accompanied by a pediatrician and a public health nurse, furnished by WHO with salaries paid out of the UNICEF allocation to Korea). The usual Agreement is concluded with the Republic of Korea in Seoul on 25 March 1950.

The allocation for Korea is \$550.000. Following discussions with the UNICEF ission Chief, the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare submitted plans of perations for UNICEF assistance for the following programmes:

) Supplementary child feeding, \$95,000; b) Equipment and technical aid calling or immunization against common contagious diseases of children, \$47,000;

) Equipment and technical aid for maternal and child health training and ervices, \$73,000. These plans of operations were approved, in accordance with he usual procedure, by the Chairmen of the Executive Board and the Programme ommittee, and by the Executive Director.

Up to the end of June, against these programmes, approximately \$56,000

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orth of supplies had been procured of which about one-half (milk and fish liver .1 in capsules) had been delivered to Korea. The bulk of the delivered supplies ud been turned over to child welfare institutions before the outbreak of ostilities.

On the morning of Sunday, June 25th, the UNICEF Mission Chief and the WHO Ivisers were evacuated from Seoul to Japan, where contact was established with the Special Representative of the Secretary-General, Colonel Alfred G. Katzin, the U.N. Commission on Korea, the U.N. Military, and representatives of the orean Republic. The UNICEF Mission Chief visited Korea again on 22-23 July the 29 July - 1 August, where he conferred with representatives of the President ' the Republic, and the Ministries of Health and Welfare, and observed contions of refugees.

During this visit the Mission Chief received a request from the Republic 'Korea for the use of the remainder of the allocation "for the provision of hergency medical and other relief supplies or services for the children and omen of Korea".

The Mission Chief is now exploring with representatives of the Republic of orea, the U.N., and other interested agencies, the kind of aid that might best given by UNICEF, with the approximately \$500,000 unexpended from the alloation to Korea. As a first step the Fund is proposing to stockpile in Japan 250,000 worth of relief supplies - milk, cod liver oil, blankets, soap and me medical supplies - to permit the prompt initiation of relief operations hen conditions permit.

On 31st July the Security Council passed a resolution relating to relief 1 Korea (relative communication from the Secretary-General is attached). This 2 solution requests the subsidiary organs of the United Nations "to provide

90 HAVE HONOR TO INFORM YOU ADOPTION OF FOLLOWING RESOLUTION AT 479th MEETING SECURITY COUNCIL HELD ON 31 JULY: THE SECURITY COUNCIL

COGNIZING THE HARDSHIPS AND PRIVATIONS TO WHICH THE PEOPLE OF KOREA ARE BEING BJECTED AS A RESULT OF THE CONTINUED PROSECUTION BY THE NORTH KOREAN FORCES THEIR UNLAWFUL ATTACK; AND APPRECIATING THE SPONTANEOUS OFFERS OF ASSISTANCE THE KOREAN PEOPLE WHICH HAVE BEEN MADE BY GOVERNMENTS' SPECIALIZED AGENCIES' D NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS; REQUESTS THE UNIFIED COMMAND TO EXERCISE SPONSIBILITY FOR DETERMINING THE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE RELIEF AND SUPPORT OF E CIVILIAN POPULATION OF KOREA, AND FOR ESTABLISHING IN THE FIELD THE COCEDURES FOR PROVIDING SUCH RELIEF AND SUPPORT; REQUESTS THE SECRETARY NERAL TO TRANSMIT ALL OFFERS OF ASSISTANCE FOR RELIEF AND SUPPORT TO THE IFFED COMMAND:

QUESTS THE UNIFIED COMMAND TO PROVIDE THE SECURITY COUNCIL WITH REPORTS, AS 'PROPRIATE, ON ITS RELIEF ACTIVITIES; REQUESTS THE SECRETARY GENERAL; THE 'ONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL IN ACCORDANCE WITH ARTICLE 65 OF THE CHARTER, OTHER 'PROPRIATE UNITED NATIONS PRINCIPAL AND SUBSIDIARY ORGANS, THE SPECIALIZED 'ENCIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS OF THEIR RESPECTIVE AGREEMENTS WITH THE 'ITED NATIONS' AND APPROPRIATE NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS TO PROVIDE SUCH 'SUSTANCE AS THE UNIFIED COMMAND MAY REQUEST FOR THE RELIEF AND SUPPORT OF THE 'VILLAM POPULATION OF KOREA, AND AS APPROPRIATE IN CONNECTION WITH THE RESPON-'BILITIES BEING CARRIED OUT BY THE UNIFIED COMMAND ON BEHALF OF THE SECURITY 'UNCIL

## : Members of the Executive Board

In early July 1950, the Fund had an outstanding requirement of approxiitely 15,000,000 pounds of dried skim milk which had to be procured in order to ulfill commitments against existing country programmes. Country budgets had cogrammed for this commodity a total of approximately \$450,000; in other words, .lk was estimated at approximately 3¢ per pound. The approximate requirements r countries are shown in the attached table at the end of this memorandum.

This month, UNICEF completed a very favorable purchase of dried skim 11k from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. For the \$450,000, the Adminisration was offered 45,000,000 pounds of dried skim milk at a cost of  $1 \neq$ >r pound.

Inasmuch as it is the expressed desire of the Executive Board to expand perations in the under-developed areas of Latin America and Asia, it is the itention of the Administration to offer the increased quantity of dried skim ilk to the countries which have outstanding requirements already budgeted for his item, as indicated in the table attached to this memorandum. In other words or the same amount of funds, these countries will receive about three times the riginally planned quantity of milk. It is the intention of the Administration o encourage countries to increase numbers of beneficiaries and/or the quantity onsumed per person. It may be advisable, in some cases, to extend the planned eriod of operations as well. In the case of Ecuador, the larger quantities will ermit expansion of numbers and continuation into the second quarter of 1951.

/This favorable .....

This favorable purchase of milk will permit operations among the lestine refugees to be extended, as far as the milk consumption is concerned, to the first quarter of 1951. In the case of Greece and Yugoslavia, which ve continuing requirements for skim milk, it will permit continuation of the esent level of milk consumption until the first of January 1951 without the ed for the increased allocations for <u>milk</u> to these countries as discussed at e last Board session.

Because of the increased quantity of skim milk purchased for the 50,000 in country allocations, it will require increased freight costs which 1 = Administration plans to take into account when additional funds will be 3 quested for the freight allocation.
