RECOMMENDATION BY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

FOR AN APPORTIONMENT TO ISRAEL

FOR MATERNAL AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICES

In this paper the Administration recommends, subject to the availability funds, the apportionment to Israel of \$40,000 from the Eastern Mediterranean ea allocation for the purchase of supplies and equipment for maternal and child alfare services. This project calls for the provision by UNICEF of general edical equipment and supplies and transport to enable special teams of sraeli doctors and nurses to provide medical services and preventive health ducation to children and mothers residing in isolated villages and settlements. If this recommendation is approved it will mark the first assistance y UNICEF to Israel for a long-range programme of child care. Previous allocations to Israel, totalling \$505,000, have all been for emergency supplies, redominantly foodstuffs, to meet emergency conditions created by problems of arge-scale immigration.

Although the figure of 46.58 infant deaths per 1,000 live births in 1950 4. s a definite decline from the figure of 51.87 in 1949, the present rate is above the previous good record of infant mortality in Israel. Most of the fai omers are of a low standard of health and with little knowledge of family of ner personal hygiene requirements. During the period of improvised camp existence, and shood diseases have increased sharply. Twenty per cent of infant deaths in chi were due to gastroenteric diseases, while fifteen per cent were from diseases 195 ne respiratory tract. The Government addressed a request to UNICEF on 23 August 1951 for con-٠٤ nued assistance in an infant and school feeding programme and for assistance th the following health programmes: maternal and child health services; prevenon and care of premature infants; handicapped children services including postliomyelitis rehabilitation and care for deaf, mute, blind and mentally deficient ildren.

Of the various plans for which assistance in the health field is requested ; is considered that the project most ready for implementation and which would we highest priority in terms of the criteria laid down by the Executive Board 3 the project to assist maternal and child health preventive services by the rovision of supplies. The remaining requests of the Government are under urther detailed discussion by the Administration, WHO and the Government.

#### THE NEED FOR UNICEF ASSISTANCE

Although the Government has been able to balance its annual internal udget (which totalled 63.5 million Israeli pounds in 1950/51), it has had to mport most of its foodstuffs, raw materials and basic equipment against scarce oreign currency resources. The continued absorption of vast immigration does ot permit the Government to expand health and welfare services entirely from its win resources, particularly where such extension calls for foreign currency expenlitures. The Government is therefore requesting UNICEF aid for certain imported equipment and transport for the extension of MCW services to rural areas as part of a plan to establish a permanent country-wide organization for MCW services.

### PLAN OF OPERATIONS

The plan of operations provides for the following:

#### (a) Objectives

To provide essential equipment for existing and anticipated expansion of Mother and Child Health Centers in rural settlements.

To enable mobile teams to pay frequent and regular visits to MCW Centres in the rural settlements.

To increase the personnel for such services by emphasis on training of public health doctors and nurses.

#### (b) What is to be Done

The Government's plan is to ensure a minimum standard of preventive health services throughout the country, even in the most outlying settlements. The method of approach will be as follows:

(i) Training of nursing personnel which is already well
developed in the several training schools in the country will
be increased in quantity, and emphasis will be placed upon
specific training for public health nurses to serve in rural areas.

(ii) Mobile teams of doctors and nurses will be attached to
the large health centres and will visit centres in the rural
districts. The teams will include a pediatrician, public
health nurses, a sanitary inspector and a social worker and
will be able to call on other specialist services when occasion
demands. These teams are already operating on a limited basis.

(iii) A MCW Center will be a focal point within its assigned
area for pre- and post-natal care, care of infants and children,

#### (f) WHO Approval

WHO's specialist in MCH services has reviewed the proposed plan with the Israel Government and has given valuable counsel in the development of the scheme. The plan has the technical approval of WHO.

- O. The request of the Government of Israel for this project includes a equest for vehicles for mobile teams of health personnel and supervisors to isit outlying settlements and villages operating out of key city public health entres. These teams of 10 to 12 people would include pediatricians, urses, sanitary inspectors and social workers and a roster of specialists ould be on call as needed.

- Government to be implemented in full and it is the Government's policy to continually operate and maintain this transport and to replace it as required on a permanent basis.
  - c. There are special emergency conditions in Israel, with a rapidly expanding immigrant population, which threaten the health and welfare of the existing population in the country.
  - d. While there is an abundance of doctors in Israel, there is a shortage of the nurses who will also be members of the team. The supply of team personnel is such that expansion of services in rural areas is possible without depriving equivalent populations elsewhere of services. In areas of sizable population the Government is establishing stationary MCW services. In many small communities it is more economical to establish a mobile system of MCW visiting teams.

#### iternational Staffing

J. UNICEF concluded an agreement with the Israel Government in February 1948. srael is included in the zone of UNICEF Chief Representative in the Eastern editerranean who maintains one member of his staff in Haifa for permanent iaison with the Government.
