Now that the cold war has ended and democracy is on the upsurge in so much of the world, we have an extraordinary opportunity, during the 1990s, to cooperate to make quantum leaps of human progress. The Convention on the Rights of the Child, that historic "Bill of Rights" for the young which entered into force as international law in 1990, says that children and young people have the right to participate, to voice their opinions and hold their own beliefs. Exercise those rights! Become activists for a better world! You are off to a good start and we at UNICEF wish you the best wishes for the success of your regional deliberations.
