Report of the Executive Director to the 77th Meeting of the Programme Committee to be held on 21 February, 1949

RESOURCES AND ALLOCATIONS

(a) <u>Resources Available for New Allocations</u>

1. As of 4 February 1949 resources available for new allocations amounted to approximately \$23,670,000 in U. S. dollar equivalents. This amount, on hand or anticipated on the basis of pledges is derived as follows:

2. I have recommended in a separate document (E/ICEF/V50) that the 2 million crowns (\$416,700) contributed by the Danish Government to UNICEF in June 1948 to permit a further expansion of anti-tubercular campaign, be formally recognized by the Board as constituting an allocation for the BCG programme. This will

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

(b) Composition of Reserves Available for New Allocations

3. The \$23,670,000, referred to in paragraph 1, available for new allocations consists of \$4,100,000 in whole milk stockpiles (E/ICEF/86, paragraphs 57-58) and the balance in 20 different currencies. The tabulation below presents the current estimate of the Administration as to the composition of the assets remaining to be allocated. However, in making use of this table it must be borne in mind that the figures arrived at are based upon the assumption that the Administration will be able to carry out its presently estimated plan of expenditures in each country where currencies are available. The estimates on these plans will undoubtedly prove to be only approximate in a number of cases; hence, the figures of the table below are, to that extent, subject to variation.

(c) Contributions and Pledges from all Sources

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4. In the month since the last statement of resources was presented to the Programme Committee, new contributions and pledges to UNICEF have amounted to \$2,779,000. This increase is composed as follows:

5. The cumulative total as of 4 February amounted to \$116,729,976. Of this total about \$101,000,000 has been transferred to UNICEF and \$16,000,000 consists of pledges and anticipated transfers. The sources of the total amount are approximately as follows:

6. The total number of Governments which have contributed or pledged to the Fund is twenty-seven. The total number of countries from which UNICEF has received a share of UNAC proceeds is 21. Three more countries and 19 British Colonial territories have advised us of forthcoming transfers of UNAC proceeds. In addition, it is reported by UNAC that the equivalent of about \$50,000 is expected to be available from 12 other countries which have had UNAC drives.

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7. The United States Government has contributed \$42,122,404 and is expected to contribute an additional \$12,566,411 to match contributions already transforred or pledged by other Governments. In order to draw the remaining \$20,311,184 of the \$75,000,000 U. S. appropriation, additional contributions of \$7,898,793 must be forthcoming from other countries; in order to draw the full \$100,000,000 authorized by the U. S. Government (of which \$75,000,000 has been appropriated) further contributions of \$9,722,222 in addition to \$7,898,793 must be forthcoming. Supply Operations

8. In the last month approximately 6,000 tons of supplies have been shipped, valued at 2,600,000. Included was the movement of 100,000 blankets to Greece (50,000 from the United Kingdom and 50,000 from the Union of South Africa) to meet the urgent needs of UNICEF assisted refugees exposed to the rigors of the winter; medical supplies valued at (120,000 to HongKong for the medical programme approved by the Board last November; and cotton valued at more than \$480,000 to Europe. Recent purchases of leather and hides have increased the total commitments for this commodity to ±400,000. The first shipments of DDT for the anti-malaria programme in Bulgaria, Rumania and Yugoslavia are scheduled to begin in the next few days. The Shipping Officer of UNICEF has in recent weeks been visiting Australia, New Zealand and will possibly visit Hongkong and Shanghai primarily on shipping problems and port arrangements. At the same time he has had the opportunity to meet with Government efficials and other interested percents to discuss generally various aspects of UNICEF operations.

/Availability of Dried

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Aveilability Of Dried Siz Lilk During 1949 From the United States

9. Due to a prolonged and temperate Fall season the production of dried skim milk during the last quarter of 1948 was greater than during the sate period in 1947; output during October and November 1948 was considerably more than in October and November 1947 and the December production showed an increase of approximately 20,000,000 pounds over the same month a year ago. Output had run at a lower rate in the first nine months of the year with a resultant drop in production of 55,000,000 pounds during the first threequarters of 1948.

10. Manufacturers' stocks have declined at a slower rate and on December 1, 1948 were more than twice the holdings of a year earlier.

11. Total output of fluid milk at the beginning of 1949 was increasing seasonably at a slightly higher level than last year. This condition should continue until the end of June 1949.

12. The resultant increase in supplies contributed to the decline in prices early last month of two to three cents per pound of skin milk bringing current prices slightly under the levels of early 1948.

13. The present stock position, being unusually high for this time of year, together with the seasonal increase in production would indicate that prices will continue their downward trend. A decided shift to other manufactured dairy products could alter this; however, and have the effect of stabilizing prices somewhat.

14. The present prediction of an increased production of fluid milk, due to higher returns per cow, the increase in butter production, together with present large stocks of skim milk in manufacturers' warehouses indicate that supplies of dried skim milk in 1949 will be amply sufficient to meet the domestic demand and the presently foreseeable export requirements.

15. In summary, present indications are that UNICEF can procure all of the skim milk it will require for the last half of 1949 at a price more favorable than last year.

/Report on

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Report on Middle East Operations

16. Since my last report to the Programme Committee a definite improvement in the picture of feeding of refugees from Palestine has been reported from cur Middle East Mission. At the end of January 1949 a total of 289,000 mothers and children were being fed with UNICEF supplies in all areas. The increase was achieved through a wide-spread effort of co-operation among very many local voluntary organizations. It is noteworthy that UNICEF, although directly involved in distribution during this period, did not expend any funds for warehousing and internal transportation involved in these distribution and feeding operations. From the 1st of February the UNRPR organization has taken over the distribution of supplies in all regions. - Northern and Southern Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Trans-Jordan, and Israel, thereby relieving the Mission of direct responsibility for distribution. 17. In accordance with the assumption of responsibility for distribution of supplies by the International Committee of the Red Cross, the League of Red Cross Societies, and the American Friends Service Committee, formal agreements were signed between these organizations and UNICEF on 2 February 1949: In effect, these agreements place the voluntary organizations in an analagous role to that of governments, with the exception, of course, of deletion of provisions regarding such items as matching supplies, diplomatic privileges, etc. Copies of the agreements are attached as Annex III. A special note should be made of the agreement with the International Red Cross, since, in the case of the Government of Israel, UNILEF has an agreement with the Government, and, therefore, the agreement with the International Red Gross was modified to take note of the mutual obligations in the agreement which is in effect between the Government of Israel and UNICEF. 18. As a result of these agreements the UNICEF representatives in the different countries will have no more responsibility for the receiving, warchousing, transportation and organization of distribution for the UNICEF supplies. All this will be done through the League of Red Cross Societies, /the International Red

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the International Red Cross Committee, and the American Friends, the UNICEF representative having to supervise the distribution of the goods according to the basic principles of UNICEF after the supplies have been allocated, according to the decision of an Allocation Board on which UNICEF will be represented.

19. With the feeding program operations under improved centrel, attention was directed during the past period to formulating plans for modical and sanitary assistance to the refugees. The Administration gave its concurrence to WHO for the allocation of (50,000 from the UNRRA (1,000,000 grant for medical programs, as requested by UNRPR. At the moment UNRPR is working on a very large-scale medical program for which it has requested UNICEF's approval to expend a total of (650,000 from the allocation for Palestine refugees. The details of this proposal are being examined currently.

Developments In S. uth Last Asia, India, Pakistan and Coylen

20. Representatives of the Fund have visited territories in the Far East during the past few weeks. The Director of the Fund's Far Eastern office, Dr. M.H. Watt has visited Batavia, Singapore, Kuola Lumpur (in Malaya), Bangkok, and Hengkong. In addition, the Deputy Director, Mr. Kalph Goodwin has visited Karachi, Delhi, and Hangcon. As a result, proposals for programs and supply lists in these areas are under active development and preliminary proposals have already been received for Indonesia and cortain of the United Kingdom territories (Singapore and the Federation of Lalaya). The Fund has appointed, as its representative to India, Mr. T. Clan Davies, formerly of the Frierds Service Unit in India and with many years experience in relief work in that country. In addition, the names of proposed candidates have been referred to other Governments for approval prior to their appointment.

21. Approximately 100,000 pounds of powdered skin milk has been delivered to Manila this week. This is in addition to the 310,000 pounds of powdered whole milk which reached Manila in December 1948 and will be used in carrying out the Philippine plan of operations approved by the Board on 3 February. In

/accordance with the

accordance with the provisions of the plan, consultations have been going forward with FAO about the Philippine feeding program, both at Headquarters and in Manila where a representative of the FAO arrived about the beginning of February.

22. A report of "Nutrition and Supplementary Feeding in the Far East" has recently been propared (E/ICEF/99) by a group of staff members from FAO, NHO and UNICEF. The purpose of this report is to provide some practical technical guidance to the UNICEF Far Eastern Staff in developing details of feeding operations with the Governments in that area. The report supplements the general child mutrition principles set forth in the report on child nutrition prepared for UNICEF by a joint FAO-WHO Committee in June 1947. <u>Anti-Malaria Program</u>

23. The World Health Organization has advised the Fund of the appointment of Dr. Morin as malariologist attached to the Far Eastern Headquarters of UNILEF. WHO has also made certain tentative proposals with respect to antimalaria demonstrations in various countries in the Far East and has recommended a joint WHO/UNICEF program in which the WHO would be responsible for certain personnel, while UNICEF would assume responsibility for other personnel and for all supplies. The final shape of the program for which, it will be recalled, the Executive Board has allocated \$300,000, awaits the joint recommendations of Dr. Morin and Dr. Watt, Director of UNICEF Far East Headquarters, after consultations with Governments in the Far East. In the meantime, the Fund is initiating procurement of certain essential anti-malaria supplies.

Utilization by WHO of Funds from (1,000,000 UNRRA Grant

24. As has been noted in paragraph 19 above, the UHO, with concurrence of UNICEF, has allocated (50,000 from the \$1,000,000 UNRRA grant for medical and sanitary programmes for Palestine refugees.

25. In addition, joint approval has been given for use from this fund of Q36,000 for fellowships to specialists from several European countries for the study of penicillin treatment of venereal diseases. These fellows

/will ultimately ...

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will ultimately form an important body of consultants who could further the application of these methods in their own and other countries. 26. A third charge on this fund which received joint agreement is the employment for a two month period starting February of a malaria consultant to help develop UNICEF malaria-insect control programmes in a number of European countries. It was necessary to start this type of consultation immediately because of the seasonal character of effective control methods.

Organization of 1949 UNLC Campaigns

27. Colonel Alfred Katzin, who is directing the UNAC campaigns has been developing his plans and is gradually building up the necessary staff. The current UNICEF news letter will feature the launching of the 1949 campaign. The Committee on Voluntary Fund Raising has held several meetings and will shortly present its recommendations to the Board.

AGREELENT BETWEEN THE AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE AND

THE UNITED NATIONS INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S EMERGENCY FUND

WHEREAS the General Assembly of the United Nations has adopted a programme for the relief of Palestinian refugees in the Middle East, contemplating an expenditure of approximately thirty million dollars and

WHEREAS the Executive Board of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund has approved on 29 October 1948 a programme to the extent of six million dollars for child and mother refugees from the combat areas in Palestine, and

WHEREAS the American Friends Service Committee has entered into an agreement with the United Nations Director of Relief for Palestinian Refugees, assuming operational responsibility in the Arab-controlled areas of southern and southwest Palestine adjacent to the Egyptian border, and

WHEREAS the contracting parties wish to cooperate as fully as possible in order to relieve the plight of the refugees in the most effective manner,

It is therefore AGREED as follows:

(1) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will look to the American Friends Service Committee as the responsible agency for the organization of distribution in feeding centres or otherwise as rapidly as may be practicable in each distribution place;

(2) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund shall be entitled to supervise the distribution of its supplies to the refugees eligibl for its assistance and assure itself that the distribution shall be in accordance with the policies and principles of the Fund;

(3) At such time as may be agreed upon with the Chief of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund Mission in the Middle East, the American Friends Service Committee shall assume responsibility for the porthandling, warehousing and transport of the United Nations International Children': Emergency Fund supplies. From the time the American Friends Service Committee has taken over all of these responsibilities for the handling of supplies, the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will be held no longer responsible for expenditures so incurred;

(4) The receipting and accounting for the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund supplies shall be made by the American Friends Service Committee to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund in accordance with procedures mutually agreed upon;

(5) That each of the contracting parties shall exchange complete information with regard to requirements and plans and programmes for meeting such requirements;

(6) That periodic meetings will be held between the two Organizations to determine the distribution of supplies available to each Organization for the purpose of agreeing upon plans for distribution and other planning;

(7) It is agreed, between the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund and the American Friends Service Committee, that suitable measures will be taken to inform the beneficiaries and in general the countries assisted on the origin and nature of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund supplies;

(6) That the respective responsibilities for carrying out this agreement in the field shall rest with the Chief of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund mission and with the representative of the American Friends Service Committee.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE LEAGUE OF RED CROSS SOCIETIES AND THE UNITED NATIONS INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S EMERGENCY FUND.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of the United Nations has adopted a programme for the relief of Palestinian refugees in the Middle East, contemplatir an expenditure of approximately thirty million dollars and

WHEREAS the Executive Board of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund has approved on 29 October 1948 a programme to the extent of six million dollars for child and mother refugees from the combat areas in Palestine, and

WHEREAS the League of Red Cross Societies has entered into an agreement with the United Nations Director of Relief for Palestinian Refugees, assuming operational responsibility in countries outside Palestine, such as Lebanon, Syria and Transjordan, and

WHEREAS the contracting parties wish to cooperate as fully as possible in order to relieve the plight of the refugees in the most effective manner,

It is therefore AGREED as follows:

(1) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will look to the League of Red Cross Societies as the responsible agency for the organization of distribution in feeding center's or otherwise as rapidly as may be practicable in each distribution place;

(2) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund shall be entitled to inspect the distribution of its supplies to the refugees eligible for its assistance and assure itself that the distribution shall be in accordance with the policies and principles of the Fund;

/(3) At such time as

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(3) At such time as may be agreed upon with the Chief of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund Mission in the Middle East, the League of Red Cross Societies shall assume responsibility for the porthandling, warehousing and transport of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund supplies within the territory assigned to the League. From the time the League of Red Cross Societies has taken over all of these responsibilities for the handling of supplies, the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will be held no longer responsible for expenditure so incurred.

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(4) The receipting and accounting for the United Nations Internation. Children's Emergency Fund supplies shall be made by the League of Red Cross Societies to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund in accordance with procedures mutually agreed upon;

(5) That each of the contracting parties shall exchange complete information with regard to requirements and plans and programmes for meeting such requirements;

(6) That periodic meetings will be held between the two Organizations to determine the distribution of supplies available to each Organization for the purpose of agreeing upon plans for distribution and other planning;

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WHEREAS the Executive Board of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund has approved on 29 October 1948 a programme to the extent of six million dollars for child and mother refugees from the combat areas in Palestine, and

WHEREAS the International Committee of the Red Cross has entered into an agreement with the United Nations Director of Relicf for Palestinian Refugees, assuming operational responsibility in North and Central Palestine (including Israel), and

WHEREAS the contracting parties wish to cooperate as fully as possible in order to relieve the plight of the refugees in the most effective manner,

It is therefore AGREED as follows:

(1) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will look to the International Committee of the Red Cross as the responsible agency for the organization of distribution in feeding centres or otherwise, as rapidly as may be practicable in distribution places in North and Central Palestine. In the application of this clause on the territory of Israel the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund and the International Committee of the Red Cross will take into consideration the agreement already concluded by the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund with the Government of Israel;

(2) The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund shall be entitled to observe the distribution of its supplies to the rofugees eligible for its assistance and assure itself that the distribution shall be in accordance with the policies and principles of the Fund;

(3) At such time as may be agreed upon with the Chief of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund Mission in the Middle East, the International Committee of the Red Cross shall assume responsibility for the port-handling, warehousing and transport of the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund supplies. From the time the International Committee of the Red Cross has taken over all of these responsibilities for the handling of supplies, the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund will be held no longer responsible for expenditures so incurred.

(4) The receipting and accounting for the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund supplies shall be made by the International Committee of the Red Cross to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund in accordance with procedures mutually agreed upon;
